<u>UK -</u> Two fifths of women are subjected to intrusive procedures during childbirth without their prior knowledge or consent, <u>a survey</u> by the Birth Trauma Association has found. <u>The Times</u> and <u>Netmums</u> report.

In England there is a huge disparity in NHS-funded treatment across the country, with very few patients able to access the <u>NICE</u> recommended three cycles of IVF. As a result PET has launched the <u>'Power of Three'</u> campaign which aims to bring awareness of this postcode lottery, and ultimately deliver change for fertility patients. You can check what level of IVF treatment funded by each Integrated Care Board (or ICB) by selecting them in their <u>'Fertility Policy Tracker'</u>.

BPAS have shared a briefing on abortion in the UK, particularly aimed at new MPs – see attachment.

The Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologist released a <u>statement</u> urging the new Government to set an ambitious vision for women's health.

US - A bill called the Maternal and Child Health Stillbirth Prevention Act signed last week by President Biden will free up millions of federal dollars toward awareness and prevention of America's 21,000 annual stillbirths. <u>USA Today</u> and <u>KTVZ.com</u> report.

Last week the Biden administration announced its latest health care initiative that would require hospital systems to meet certain maternal health care standards in order to remain in Medicare and Medicaid. Under the proposal, safety standards would be set for obstetric services at all hospitals and would impact staffing, training, and the various protocols pertaining to obstetric patients.

Poland – Prime Minister Donald Tusk and his centrist coalition government suffered a bitter defeat Friday in parliament, where a slim majority rejected legislation that would have eased the strict antiabortion law. Le Monde and The Financial Times report.

World Population Day - On World Population (11 July) a <u>Joint Statement</u> from WHO, UNFPA, UNICEF, UNAIDS, and UN Women was released calling on all stakeholders to prioritise sexual and reproductive health and rights for all.

SRHR in Fragile Settings – A new study, Reproductive, maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health services in humanitarian and fragile settings: A mixed methods study of midwives' and women's experiences shares significant, but unsurprising findings regarding insufficient numbers of midwives in humanitarian and fragile settings, rising workloads, insufficient and/or inconsistent resources that limit care provision by midwives, threats to the safety and security of midwives and more.

Disability Inclusion in SRHR Resources – The Women's Integrated Sexual Health (WISH), a five-year programme funded by the FCDO, has produced a report that outlines their disability inclusion model, achievements and lessons learned from their experiences Committed to leaving no one behind (lessons on disability-inclusion).

Air Pollution/IVF – A new study finds that exposure to air pollution reduces the chance of a successful birth through IVF. Researchers analysed exposure to fine particulate matter at various points before the patients' eggs were collected and followed them throughout their pregnancies later on. Euronews and The Times report.

The Gambia – Gambian lawmakers have voted to uphold a 2015 ban on female genital mutilation (FGM), rejecting a controversial bill seeking to overturn the law after months of heated debate and international pressure. The Women's (Amendment) Bill 2024, which had sought to decriminalise the practice of female circumcision, had passed a second reading in March with only five out of 53 lawmakers voting against it, raising concerns among rights groups that The Gambia would become the first country to reverse a ban on the practice. The BBC and CNN report. UN, UNFPA and WHO released a joint statement in support.
