<u>NEWS</u>

UK: Baroness Hussein-Ece sent a letter and a request to meet and the UK Network on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights sent a letter of welcome and an update to Anneliese Dodds MP on her appointment as Minister for Development and Minister for Women and Equalities (see attachments).

New research published in The Lancet (see full article, attached) show that people who took the first dose of misoprostol (a pill given as part of the procedure for medical abortions) at home had a 71% chance of completing their care in hospital within 9 hours with no overnight stay when having an abortion after 12 weeks of pregnancy, compared to 46% of those who took the first dose of misoprostol at hospital. Forbes, The Mail Online and PBS News report.

The latest UK Family Court Statistics have revealed a significant 20% increase in Forced Marriage Protection Orders (FMPOs) in 2023. The number of FMPOs issued this year is the second highest since their introduction in 2008. <u>Karma Nirvana</u> reports.

140 women who experienced distressing side effects after getting vaginal mesh implants have won payouts expected to stretch into millions of pounds in England. The women, whose case constitutes the first successful group claim in England, have come to a settlement with the manufacturers Johnson & Johnson, Bard, and Boston Scientific. <u>BBC News</u> and <u>The Mail Online</u> report.

An official inspection by HM Inspectorate of Constabulary uncovered serious concerns about how the Metropolitan Police investigates crimes against women, including evidence that victims are being put at risk by the Met's failure to "safely manage" sex offenders and domestic abusers. <u>ITV News</u> and <u>The Times</u> report.

More than a year after becoming law, buffer zones around abortion clinics have still not been implemented. <u>The Independent</u> and <u>The Guardian</u> report.

Surrogacy: The Telegraph has published a deep-dive into the global surrogacy trade. The global market – already worth almost \$18 billion (£14 billion) – is projected to rise to \$129bn by 2032, according to the research firm Global Market Insights, with anywhere between 5,000 and 20,000 babies incubated to order annually.

The Fertility Business: <u>The Financial Times</u> reports on the rise of the industry as increasing numbers of people plan to have families later.

Africa: <u>The Financial Times</u> reports that Sub-Saharan African countries could cut high rates of child mortality if the World Health Organization recommended expanding the use of a crucial antibiotic beyond the earliest age group, according to new <u>research</u>.

<u>The Guardian</u> reports on training on Female Genital Schistosomiasis (FGS) in Kenya, affects an estimated 56 million women and girls, mostly in sub-Saharan Africa, but remains a largely unknown, neglected condition.

USA: A <u>new report</u> published by Human Rights Watch examines the growing risk that wlidfire season poses to pregnant people and lays out recommendations for how to address the threat. The international advocacy organization worked with Nurturely, a nonprofit focused on perinatal care in Oregon, to interview over 50 birth workers like doulas and midwives, public health officials and climate experts to better understand how wildfire seasons in the state are playing out for pregnant people. <u>Civil Beat</u> and <u>Las Vegas Sun</u> report.

HIV: A twice-a-year anti-HIV drug, lanacapavir, has been shown to be so effective that a trial was halted when not one of the 2,134 women given the drug became infected. <u>The Telegraph</u> and <u>Health</u> <u>Affairs</u> report.

The PMNCH Annual Report presents the highlights of the impact achieved in 2023 across three main focus areas: maternal, newborn and child health (MNCH); sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR); and adolescent well-being (AWB).
